Why remember?

- 1. It can warn us of dangers (Deut 9:7)
- 2. It can spur our obedience and fuel encouragement and growth (Deut 4:9; Rev 2:5)
- 3. It encourages our perseverance (Heb 11)
- 4. It revitalizes the impact of worthy examples (Heb 13:7; Ac 20:31)

The value of Remember, Reflect, Recalibrate

- 5. It's part of God's design for our worship (Ps 111:1–4)
- 6. It fuels our hope for eternity (1 Thes 4:13)

Good News (when God remembers)

Our sins no more (Heb 8:12)

Noah (Gen 8:1)

Abraham (Gen. 19:29

Rachel (Gen 30:22)

His covenant (Ex 2:24; Lu 1:54, 72)

Knowing that God remembers is a mark of hope and new possibilities.

Remembering our loved ones who died in Christ, we have:

Hope (1 Thes 4:13)

We have the promise of reunion (1 Thes 4:13-17)

Comfort (1 Thes 4:18; 2 Cor 1; Ps 30:11)

Compassion (Heb 4:15-16)
